Congregational Meeting Update

On November 22nd Trinity held a Special Congregational Meeting to vote on updating our constitution to include the following section:

C10.08. This congregation may hold meetings by remote communication, including electronically and by telephone conference, as long as there is an opportunity for simultaneous aural communication. To the extent permitted by state law, notice of all meetings may be provided electronically.

At that meeting the congregation did vote to update the constitution. This amendment gives your church council the ability to hold our annual congregational meeting via electronic means in the event the council does not feel that it is safe to meet in person. The amendment just provides the option of holding the meeting electronically, but it would be up to the church council to decide how the meeting will be held. At this time the council has not decided if we will hold the meeting electronically.

President Scott Delzer called the council meeting of Trinity Church to order at 7:00 P.M. Members absent and excused were Nancy Sabbe, Kristin Morse, and Pastor Dirk.

The council was led in devotions and prayer by Vice President Rob Thuringer.

The Agenda was presented and added to the business was Christmas services and congregation constitution amendment. A motion to approve the agenda was made by Becky Brown and seconded by Ryan Townsend. Motion passed.

The council minutes from October 13th were presented by President Scott and a motion to approve them was made by Tim Walburg and seconded by Rob Thuringer. Motion passed.

President Delzer discussed the financial report and we are behind \$15,570.40. A motion to accept the report was made by Ryan Townsend and seconded by Rob Thuringer. Motion accepted.

Pastor Dirk is in Germany and they have locked down and not sure when he will be able to come home.

Vice President Rob Thuringer reported his report on the call committee will come under new business.

Board of Parish Ed. Chairman Susan Farrell-Poncelet reported:

- Their board met concerning Preschool for the next school year.
 - The Sunday school superintendent, Amy Winrow, has resigned and we will need to replace her
 - Amber Coomes is working on the ICAP Christmas Tree
 - Discussed Confirmation which will be held in April
- Board of Deacon Becky Brown reported:

Worship & Music:

- Discussion was held regarding Christmas Eve services. We are going by the numbers from last year’s average attendance and numbers and the Deacons feel it is not possible to hold services in person safely and recommend doing an online option as a possibility. Would also like to see what the other churches are planning.

Services & Sacraments:

- Discussed the baptism bowl which is in bad con-

dition and Jim Iverson will get information on what we need to do if we refinish silver at a price of \$400.00 or purchase a new bowl.

Evangelical Outreach:

- Discussion was held regarding streaming (audio) services on KJAM. They will monitor the livestream and rebroadcast the audio at 11:00 a.m. for \$50.00 per service. Bob tested current equipment and he will be able to stream on YouTube which will give us better audio sound.
- A motion was made by Becky Brown to approve broadcasting services by audio on KJAM each week at 11:00 a.m. for a fee of \$50.00/service, once YouTube livestream is in place. Jim Iverson seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Board of Trustees Tim Walburg reported:

- Issues with the north tower and they are working with Don Amert about repairs
- Alex reported that when he starts the organ for service it blows a fuse so we will have him call an electrician.

President Delzer asked for a motion to approve the reports and that was made by Ryan Townsend and seconded by Josh Van Dyke. Motion passed.

New Business:

- Call Committee Rob Thuringer reported we will have a congregation meeting on November 16th at 7:00 p.m. at the church with guidelines from the synod, and it will be live streamed so people can ask questions and give opinions as to what we want for an associate pastor.
- Rev. Renee Splichal Larson from the synod will be present at the meeting.

On November 22nd a short meeting will be conducted in the church parking lot from your vehicles at 10:00 a.m. to change the constitution amendment so it may be held on Zoom if it would need to be with the Covid-19.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Rob Thuringer and seconded by Becky Brown. Motion passed. We closed with the council praying The Lord’s Prayer.

The next council meeting will be December 8th.

Missionary Update

Walking in Hong Kong with Matt Hafar

November, 2020

Greetings from the serene campus of the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Hong Kong! In the midst of one of the world's most crowded cities, I have the privilege to teach and build relationships on the top of a peaceful mountain. As the weather cools into the 70s and 80s (!) I have the opportunity to spend time enjoying blooming flowers and swimming fish! I thank God for serenity, but my newsletter today is about our church's work in Hong Kong and about building relationships!

Although we are not letting our guard down too much, the virus situation here is not bad. We have been able to return to face-to-face teaching, which has made a world of difference for me. We check our temperatures and wash our hands at the beginning of each class, and keep the doors and windows open. We wear our masks throughout. I am so glad to be seeing real people!

When last I wrote, I had just concluded an orientation program for a new group of five students from Myanmar to LTS. Our relationship has continued to grow since then! They each have me for at least one class, and we often spend time with each other informally.

Soon after they were free from their long quarantine, I called them to my office to present them with an English Bible—just a small welcome gift. But they outdid me! When they arrived, they came with many gifts for me: a necktie from the Karen people; a book bag from the Chin State; and, from the Kachin State, a beautiful wicker basket with a colorful neck strap. Needless to say, both containers were filled with food items from Myanmar.

Perhaps because I still feel pretty new myself, I feel a strong connection to them. The more we talk and they write, I am aware of our many differences. We don't always agree on social and theological issues, and I need to remind myself frequently to listen and keep an open mind. (Sometimes I encourage them to do the same!) But we share so much, and the longer I am here, the more convinced I am that the relationships we have the opportunity to develop, among faculty and students, are the reason we are all here together.

We continue to engage the students here with our family groups. My colleague Francis and I lead the Family of Joy, a group of international students from

throughout Southeast Asia. Last month, Francis hosted a pasta-making lunch for us.

We prepared the dough, forced it through the hand-cranked machine, set the pieces out to dry, and enjoyed a terrific afternoon of conversation and delicious food.

It's not all food and fellowship! I am teaching three classes, preaching occasionally at morning chapel and at the nearby Christ Temple, playing a little music, helping doctoral students edit their dissertations, and tackling other duties as assigned. I'm grateful for this experience and for all the ways it has stretched me. I miss being at home at times, but I know that time will come soon!

Gift of Grain

Bethel Lutheran Home and Foundation are a member of Lutheran Planned Generosity of SD. As a member we invite you to consider a non-cash gift of grain in support of Bethel and/or your church.



“Honor the Lord with your substance and with the first fruits of all your produce.” —Proverbs 3:9

If you farm, your crops are your life and the livelihood for which you work so hard. You nurture them from the time you plant until the time you harvest. Sharing your gifts of grain to support the ministries you care about most — including the Bethel Lutheran Community and Foundation — is a meaningful way you can share your harvest with others.

Here is how it works: As a producer, you can make a gift of grain or livestock with your unsold inventory. Upon receiving notice of your intent to make a gift, LPGSD will establish an account at the appropriate elevator or sale barn. We will distribute the sale proceeds to Bethel according to your wishes. A gift of grain can be used as an outright gift to the Bethel Community or Foundation, or to establish/grow a donor advised fund.

Why should I make a gift of grain? What are the benefits? Using stored commodities or unsold inventory to make a gift maximizes the benefit to Bethel while reducing taxable income. No income is recorded on a gift of grain, but production costs remain as part of your deductible expenses. Here is an example:

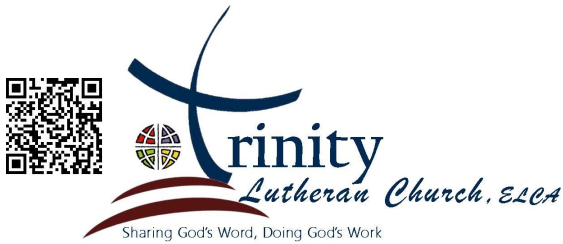
